### Abstracts and the Writing of Abstracts by John M. Swales

An abstract is a short summary of a thesis, article, review, analysis, or any other in-depth academic work or writing. Its main purpose is to help readers understand what a particular paper is about and what its purpose is. An abstract usually goes at the very beginning, before the actual work it describes.

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Abstracts are short, informative writings that serve as screening tools or previews for research papers, conference presentations, and other communications. The focus of an abstract (summary vs. results) and its format (headings vs. no headings) vary across contexts. Writers in all contexts give their texts similar functions such as “reviewing literature”, “identifying a problem” or “describing an approach”.

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To write an abstract, start with a short paragraph that explains the purpose of your paper and what it's about. Then, write a paragraph explaining any arguments or claims you make in your paper. Follow that with a third paragraph that details the research methods you used and any evidence you found for your claims.

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An abstract is a brief overview, not an evaluative summary of a longer piece of writing. Different kinds of abstracts contain different information. Social science and scientific abstracts contain a statement of the research problem or purpose, a statement about current approaches and a gap in the literature (for theses, but not always journal articles), a statement of the method and methodology and a summary of the findings and the conclusions.
